Our speakers will be the author and the subject of a fascinating book titled *The Chance: The True Story of One Girl's Journey to Freedom*.

Muoi Quan (now known as Lisa Cheng) left war-torn Vietnam very suddenly in 1979 without her parents and with only the clothes she was wearing. She was just twelve years old. She was only nine as she watched in horror as the city of Saigon fell to the Communists. A year later,



the military invaded her home and destroyed her family's medicine business. Subsequently, she was able to escape her home country. She eventually landed in the US where her final destination became Oklahoma City.

Along the way, Lisa Cheng suffered intense fear, sorrows, and struggles. Today, she expresses gratitude for "the chance" to become an American citizen. Currently, she is the owner/operator of Airway

Travel in north Oklahoma City where she lives with her family.

Bruce Baker is a retired IT executive and middle-school English teacher who lives in the Oklahoma City area with his wife Deborah. His short stories have been



published in *Murder, Mystery, and Mayhem* and *Too Well Away Literary Journal*. He is also the author of two narrative non-fiction memoirs of Vietnam natives. One is the story of Lisa Cheng. The other is titled *Faith Through Trial, a True Story of Hope and Survival*.

SNU AWARDED OKLAHOMA HERITAGE PRESERVATION GRANT

Southern Nazarene University has been awarded a grant through the Oklahoma Heritage Preservation Grant Program. The grant of just over \$14,000 is for a project titled "Preserving and Making Accessible Recordings at Risk." Over 450 audio and video recordings will be made accessible through the university's library catalogue.

The Oklahoma Heritage Preservation Grant Program is a grants-in-aid program offered by the Oklahoma Historical Society with a goal of encouraging the collection, preservation and sharing of Oklahoma history.

SNU Connections by Howard Culbertson

Our interviewee for the SNU Connections moments in the May luncheon will be Ashley Armstrong, the director of Southern Nazarene University's Student Health Center. She was supposed to be with us in January, but school cancellations prevented that.



Ashley is herself a graduate of SNU, having graduated with a multidisciplinary degree in business and nursing. She did her course requirements at Oklahoma State University to be licensed as a Registered Nurse. After getting her R.N. license, she spent 13 years working as a nurse for Integris Health. During part of that time, she also worked as a school nurse for Mustang Public Schools.

Last spring, Ashley Armstrong came to SNU to be the director of the Student Health Center. That center has a walk-in clinic on the bottom floor of the Commons building (directly under the Heritage Room where we meet for our luncheon meetings). It also uses space on the main floor of the Commons for a COVID testing center.

The Student Health Center aims to provide primary care and health education to students (and even to faculty and staff). The Health Center functions as a division of Student Life. Directed by a registered nurse who reports directly to Executive Vice President Mike Redwine, the center has had a higher profile than normal during the COVID-19 pandemic period. The center got especially busy when students, professors and staff returned to campus after having been away for breaks and therefore all had to submit to COVID tests.

Book Discussion by Barbara Culbertson


