

AN OPEN LETTER TO

SOUTHERN NAZARENE UNIVERSITY FRIENDS OF THE BAKER GOLF CLASSIC

"...we feel that we should do more for our young people. We therefore recommend: That at their discretion the administration be granted authority to arrange for athletic participation with other Christian colleges. This is not to be interpreted as a recommendation for an open inter-collegiate athletic program." (Bethany Nazarene College (BNC) Board of Trustees meeting minutes February 11, 1964)

With that simple statement, a new era at BNC was born. It was one small step for a Board of Trustees but one giant leap into the unknown for an eager group of student athletes. That decision was made as the 1963-64 varsity Redskins, coached by Don Wilson, were in the middle of a 15-5 season against men's industrial and church league teams. According to student newspaper records, that season included a February 15th 108-101 win over Oklahoma Christian intramural all-stars and a March 6th 106-90 win against Southwestern Bible College.

The 1964-65 school year was the first full year of athletic competition versus other Christian college men's basket-ball programs. David Baker was hired to direct the varsity program. With an abbreviated schedule of 14 games, that first team finished with a record of 8 and 6. The season highlight was a home court 89-85 win over Evangel College from Springfield, Missouri, who finished their season at 20-3. BNC home games were played in the "tabernacle" gym at the south end of the campus mall. Broadhurst gymnasium was completed in 1966.

That inaugural team consisted of students who chose to attend BNC because they were seeking a Christian college education to be equipped for a place of service in the adult world. In God's grand design they were given an opportunity to use their athletic abilities to support the "Character, Culture, and Christ" mission of the college.

Those early years were tough! The program grew to establish a place of prominence in the NAIA and NCCAA organizations. From that small beginning of one varsity team in one sport, SNU student athletes now participate on twenty-two teams in men's and women's sports in state-of-the-art facilities. After going through name changes (BNC to SNU and Redskins to Crimson Storm), it is fitting that we honor our roots and celebrate intercollegiate competition as a member of the NCAA Division II in the Great American Conference. Go Storm!!!



THE ATHLETE

David Baker (1937-2002) grew up in Bartlesville, OK and is the man we honor with this event. He was a three sport All-Stater in football, basketball, and baseball. He enrolled at the University of Oklahoma in 1955 under

Baker played
cornerback for the

49ers for three seasons (1959-1961) and still holds the 49ers' interception record per season, having 21 career interceptions, averaging 7 per season. In 1959, his rookie season, he was selected to the NFL All-Pro team. After serving two years in the US Army, a return to the NFL to a signed contract seemed imminent.

THE PROFESSOR AND COACH

However, by divine intervention, a different path would be charted. In 1964 Dr. Roy are possible Cantrell, President of SNU, asked David to help begin intercollegiate athletics and be a professor of physical education. The position would professor, include serving as the first athletic director and head basketball coach. Setting aside a lucrative in the "riginal NFL contract and all of its amenities, David and Edna Baker traveled to Bethany, OK, signed an SNU contract worth \$3,600 annually, and began a dream.

THE VISIONARY

With no intercollegiate program, no scholarships, and no budget, Coach Baker set out with a vision that SNU could become one of America's finest small college athletic programs. At age 27, with a background in the country's finest collegiate football program (OU) and the NFL (49ers), Baker believed that the greatest impact and athletic experience could happen where "athletics in a Christian atmosphere" thrived.

During Baker's tenure (1964-1974) a long list of significant accomplishments occurred: the first men's basketball season garnered a winning mark; Benchwarmer Club formed in 1968; first funded scholarships awarded in 1969; Redskin Revolution changed the course of sportsmanship in society; women's basketball, volleyball, and men's and women's tennis were added; defensive innovation of a big man playing point on a 3-2 zone added in 1971 and copied nationwide; Spokesman Bicycle Tour group formed in 1972; and the goal to achieve a national title in 10 years was set and reached with men's basketball title in 1981 under Coach Loren Gresham; all under the foundation of Mark 9:23..." all things are possible to him who believes."

I speak for many when I say, Coach David Baker was a life-changer for me. As my coach, professor, mentor, colleague, and friend, he inspired me to be all that I could be, to live life in the "right way with the right priorities" and "love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, mind and strength." I will forever be indebted.
